Moth Night & Star Gazing - Saturday 21st August 2021

Last Saturday we held a Moth Night at the Wick Country Park with a telescope available for star gazing. We were lucky with the weather as we managed to avoid any showers and the weather was fine for the whole evening. The moth attracting light was set up at around 8.45pm and was attracting moths more or less straight away. Several species were identified with such wonderful names as Old Lady, Ruby Tiger and Flame Shoulder. The variety of moths coming to the light was fascinating being of various sizes, shapes and colours. In addition to the moths, the resident flock of Canada Geese were very active, flying around calling to each other, and we also saw/heard a couple of Foxes. A Pipistrelle Bat was also identified with a bat detector – probably feeding on the moths!

After an hour or so, the skies started to clear and it became noticeably colder, and this reduced the moth activity to more or less zero! They obviously don't like clear cool nights. However, we were then able to do a bit of star gazing and managed to get great views of Jupiter with 3 moons and then Saturn with its rings. As discussed on the night, at the moment Jupiter is 600M km from Earth which is approx. 373,000,000 miles. Saturn is a ridiculous 1,347bn Km from Earth which is 853,000,000 miles!! This illustrates how large Saturn must be if we can see it from 850 million miles away!

By 11pm the sky was completely clear and no moths were being attracted to the light, so we decided to call it a day and head home. Overall this was a very enjoyable evening and we did manage to see quite a few moths and do some star gazing as promised.

Common Wainscot	Mythimna pallens	21/08/2021	2	A pale moth and again a common resident.
Dingy Footman	Eilema griseola	21/08/2021	1	Common in Southern Britain.
Flame Shoulder	Ochropleura plecta	21/08/2021	1	Has a bright straw coloured band on the forewing. Common resident.
Gypsy Moth	Lymantria dispar	21/08/2021	1	Incredible antennae that looked like bird feathers. Sat for ages so we all had good views. An immigrant from the Continent in Southern England.
Lesser Broad- bordered Yellow Underwing	Noctua janthe	21/08/2021	1	Nice orange/yellow underwing. Again a Common resident.
Lime-speck Pug	Eupithecia centaureata	21/08/2021	1	A pale moth with dark markings on the wings. Another common resident.
Oak Processionary	Thaumetopoea processionea	21/08/2021	1	Identified by Colin at home. An immigrant from the Continent
Old Lady	Mormo maura	21/08/2021	1	The largest moth we had on the night – large dark brown moth. A local resident in the UK.
Orange Swift	Hepialus sylvina	21/08/2021	1	Dark orange wings with white markings. Common resident.
Ruby Tiger	Phragmatobia fuliginosa	21/08/2021	1	My favourite on the night – ruby red body with dark red wings. Common resident.

Silver Y	Autographa gamma	21/08/2021	1	Has a metallic silver Y mark on the wings. An immigrant from Europe that breeds every year.
Straw Dot	Rivula sericealis	21/08/2021	1	Pale yellow moth with dark "kidney" mark. Resident and possible immigrant.
Straw Underwing	Thalpophila matura	21/08/2021	2	Dark forewing with white cross lines. Common resident.
Water Veneer	Acentria ephemerella	21/08/2021	2	A moth who's larvae spend their lives under water. Common resident.
White-point	Mythimna albipuncta	21/08/2021	1	Orange brown wings with white spot. A regular immigrant to SE England.
Willow Beauty	Peribatodes rhomboidaria	21/08/2021	1	Light brown moth with feathered antennae. Common resident.
Yellow Shell	Camptogramma bilineata	21/08/2021	1	Nicely marked yellow moth with waved wing patterns. Common resident.
